

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
"At Your right hand stands the queen" (Ps. 45:9)

From the book: THE LIFE OF THE MOTHER OF GOD

After the dormition of the Virgin Mary the disciples carried the bier on which her sacred body lay and went to the place known as the field of Jehoshaphat to bury it. On their way, the Jews saw them and ordered a man named Tawphina to snatch the bier and await them at the top of the mount where they would burn the body. Tawphina walked behind the Apostles and before they reached the mount, he advanced, stretched out his impure hands and held the bier. With his fiery sword, the angel of the Lord struck him on the shoulder, cutting off his arms which remained attached to the bier while he fell on the ground screaming and begging the disciples, "Have mercy on me; I did this in my ignorance, forced by the wicked Jews. My name is Tawphina and I am the man who was paralysed for thirty-eight vears at the Pool of Bethesda. When the Lord healed me. He ordered me not to return to sin lest I be afflicted with worse. But I have now fallen into greater sin. Please pray for me and ask the Lady to have compassion on me a sinner." The Apostles prayed for him and, through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, he was healed.

When the disciples laid down the sacred body of the Virgin in the tomb and rolled a stone over its mouth, a great light shone around them and they smelled a sweet fragrance and heard a voice saying, "Blessed are you, O full of grace. The Lord is with you." The apostles fell down and the angels took the body of the Virgin and ascended with it to heaven without being seen by the apostles.

St. Thomas was the only apostle who did not attend the Virgin Mary's dormition and burial. He



was in India hindered from attending that sacred event by a certain reason unknown to the apostles. The Lord willed to reveal to him the great mystery of our Lady's Assumption. On his return from India, he was carried by a cloud to the field of Jehoshaphat. While on the cloud he saw the Virgin's body being carried by hosts of angels who told him that that was the body of the Virgin Mary who had reposed and the Lord commanded them to lift it up to Paradise. He greatly rejoiced and invoked the Virgin to pray for him and bless him. Suddenly a belt dropped on him. He picked it up, kissed it and kept it.

Then the cloud alighted St. Thomas at the place where the apostles were gathered. He told them that he had a great desire to see the body of the Virgin Mary.

The apostles escorted St. Thomas to the tomb where they laid her body. They rolled the stone and

entered the tomb but could not find the body of the Virgin. They were astounded and puzzled, not knowing what had happened. St. Thomas started to explain to them, saying, "Do not be sad, my brethren, because today I saw the body of my Lady the Virgin Mary carried by angels to Paradise according to the Lord's command. When I asked her to bless me, I found this belt dropping on me. St. Thomas took out the belt and showed it to the apostles. With great astonishment they examined it and recognized it as the same belt which they themselves had wrapped around her sacred body.

On the 15th of Mesra, seven months after the Lady's dormition, the apostles gathered in the tomb and spent the whole night in vigil, singing and praying to be blessed with an appearance of the Virgin Mary's Assumption. At dawn of 16th Mesra, they heard the sound of a great thunderstorm and host of angels appeared to them. Then the Lord Jesus Christ, carried on the cherubim, appeared to them with the holy Virgin His mother at His right. He gave them peace and they worshipped Him, giving Him glory for his mercy and tender care.

- 8. I observe the way the group is working and point out to them what's happening so we can work together better.
- 9. I keep the group motivated to work toward its goals.
- 10. I bring out into the open any conflicts between members and try to help them resolve them.
- 11. I ask others to summarize group discussions and decisions to be sure they understand what's been said and done.
- 12. I express my appreciation for other group members and for their contributions.

A REIGN OF TERROR IN THE INDEPENDENT REPUBLIC OF DAIRUT



Isnt't there an End to this Nightmare?

Those were the captions of two leading articles published in WATANI, the Coptic Sunday newspaper on 6/28/1992. Mr. Sidhom received a message from one of the residents of Dairut, a city in Upper Egypt. Mr. Sidhom, however; selected not to reveal the writer's name in order to protect him against reprisals by the extremist Moslem fundamentalist. Following is a translation of the highlights of the letter:

- A number of Moslem fundamentalists for the selfstyled "Gamaat El Islamiya" set upon and insultedd His Grace Bishop Barsoum of Dairut and snatched his pastoral staff and cross. This incident, however, was kept under lock and seal.
- It is prohibited for any priest or Christian religious man to walk in the streets of Dairut and adjacent villages, Sanabu and Menshiet Nasser; otherwise, punishment is immediately inflicted upon him by spitting or stonning.
- Christian youth are kept under surveillance by the Islamic group. Those who daily go to Church to attend the liturgy are intimadated. Letters with the symbol of the Gamaat El Islamiya are sent to them, but if they do not stop going to Church, they are beaten by chains and iron pipes. Bones in some cases are smashed and some have become bed ridden forever.
- At El Saieh mosque in Dairut, a Kangaroo (judgment or punishment given outside of legal procedure) trial is held for Christians every Friday evening. The sentence is usually either to smash the bones of some or to tear down the flesh of others.

The register of the Central Dairut Hospital is an irrefutable evidence of such incidents.

- Christians are not allowed to celebrate any religious festival or visit the Moharaq Monastery of the Virgin Mary at Quosia, Assiut. The Moslem fundamentalists spread everywhere blocking the way of Christians and forcing them to return.
- Every Sunday morning and during the religious meetings held at the Church, some fundamentalist boys carrying bottles filled with tar and ink splash the clothes of women on their way to Church, thus forcing them to return. If a Christian, thereafter files a complaint with the police, the answer is that he has to complain to the "Amir" or prince of the Gamaat El Islamiya as the police is powerless before them; an answer of laxity, incompetence and indifferenc.
- The Christian pupils in Dairut and surrounding villages suffer at the hands of their Moslem teachers. Christian teachers are subjected to various levels of intimidation and humiliation being called infidels with the word written on blackboards by their own Moslem pupils. Lessons on Islamic religion have become lessons in ways and means of undermining the morale of Christian teachers and pupils.
- Even our messages and telegrams, according to the writer of the letter, to the authorities are routinely censored and not delivered. The text of those messages and telegrams shows up thereafter in the hands of the member of the Gamaat El Islamiya.
- Atrocities, brutalities and butchering of Copts is the order of the day in the streets of Dairut.

According to the correspondent of the Los Angeles Times (Sunday, July 12, 1992), "The Gamaat became the law in Manshiet Nasser. Nearly 70 Christian shops were burned and ransacked... doctors and shopkeepers were murdered. A Christian was murdered and then hacked up with butcher knives in nearby Sanabu". A foreign diplomat stationed in Egypt commented, according to L.A. Times, "The events in themselves are scary

enough, but they are indicators of some underlying trends that are even scarier. It is hard for me to be as optimistic about the future of this country as I was a month ago... You should ask the question, Has the government lost control of Upper Egypt? It is not an impossible proposition."




- 1. **The fast of St. Mary** is 15 days starting from Friday, August 7 to Saturday 22. The liturgy of **St. Mary's Feast** will be celebrated on Saturday the 22nd from 8:00 11:00 A.M.
- 2. During St. Mary's fast, there will be two weekday liturgies, on Wednesday and Friday from 8:00 10:15 A.M. And during the second week there will be Revival Meetings every night from 7:30 9:00 P.M.

Notice that we do not fast for St. Mary but for God, because fasting is one of the means of worship (Matthew 6:16-18), and worship must be directed only to God according to the Scriptures, "For it is written, 'You shall worship the Lord your God, and Him only you shall serve." (Matthew 4:10)

- 3. The Feast of Transfiguration is on Wednesday 19, there will be a liturgy and vespers. The story of the Transfiguration is found in Matthew 17, Mark 9 & Luke 9.
- 4. The Papal Visit of H.H. Pope Shenouda III, is expected, God willing, to start with New York on the 4th of September. His Holiness, will visit Boston, Cleveland and may be Canada, Florida, other states, and reach Los Angeles about the 16th of September. He will hold a two-day conference with all the priests of U.S. and Canada in L.A., and two-day Lectures in Los Angeles Coptic Seminary. He will pray only one liturgy in the Consecration Service of the Cathedral of Archangel Michael at Orange County on Sunday the 20th, holding some meetings with the youth, the ministers, committees, and the

- whole congregation, visits St. Antony Monstery and leaves L.A., on the 24th of September.
- 5. The Youth Summer Club, during August will be 3 days only, Tuseday, Wednesday and Thursday, and will close at the end of August. Every evening there is a Bible Study which begins at 8:30 P.M. The spiritual part is mandatory to all participants who are over 16 years old.
- 6. The Youth 3rd Annual Conference will be held in Arrowhead Springs, CA from August 10 to August 14 under the leadership of H. Grace Bishop Moussa, H.G. Bishop Thomas and the West Coast Clergy.
- 7 The Monthly Clergy Meeting will be held with the Bishops during the youth convention at Arrowhead Springs.
- 8. The Arabic youth meeting held a two-day conference at Arrowhead Springs on July 25, 26.

68 A.D.

"The mob forced its way into the Church and seized the saint (St. Mark), put a rope around his neck, and dragged him about the streets. With the connivance of the authorities, St. Mark was incarcerated for the night... On the following day, he was again dragged over the cobbled roads of Alexandria, his body becoming lacerated and his blood covering the ground, until he finally died... it appears that St. Mark was decapitated after his martyrdom." (Coptic Encyclopedia)

4th Century

"And we ourselves also beheld,... many all at once in a single day some of whom suffered decapitation, others the punishment of fire; so that the murderous axe was dulled and, worn out, was broken in pieces, while the executioners themselves grew utterly weary and took it in turns to succeed one another"... (Esubious)

8th Century

"Incarceration, flogging, amputation of limbs, and even outright murder of a delinquent subject were customary punishments... Copts were to be branded with the mark of a lion "... (Coptic Encyclopedia)

14th Century

"A procession entered its (Cairo) gates consisting of a great stream of men and women,... who as they marched, cried aloud, 'We are Christians! We renounce Islam and its Prophet! with shame we confess that we deserted Christ for fear of persecution!'... When it was found that not one of

them would yield either to threat or promise, it was determined to make an example of the men first. One by one they were beheaded, before the eyes of the women. These, however, remained firm, crying the more that they preferred death to the betrayal of their Lord. The chief Kadi,... ordered the guards to take all the band of women to the foot of the citadel and there behead them all." (Modern Sons of the Pharaohs)

June 1992

"Muslim attack on Copts leaves 14 dead... the fact that there had been an attack did not stun the authorities. Such attacks take place nearly every week in Cairo"... (New York Times)

"We are hard pressed on every side, yet not crushed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed" (2 Cor. 4:8-9). This has been the story of the Copts.

In fact we are Orthodox in faith and belief, we are also Coptic Orthodox Christians. As Coptic Orthodox Christian we take pride in the fact that only our Church was mentioned, prophecied about, and its people blessed in the Holy Bible (Isa. 19:19 & 19:25). But one thing which is very important to remember is that we hold three titles: 1. Christians 2. Orthodox 3. Copts. Before everything else, we are Christians, the adopted Children of God. Secondly, we have Orthodox beliefs and correct faith. Finally, we are Copts (Egyptians) the sons of the Pharoahs and the martyrs. Throughout history the Coptic Church has defined the true way, the more pressured and persecuted we became, the more we held to the

Lord's promisses and the true Orthodox way. Unfortunetly at the times that the Lord willed that persecutions would ease, we too sought after an easier way of life. So, if the Church might seem as if it has become weaker, it is due to the current recession in persecution which we here in the foreign countries are feeling. It is very interesting to note that outside Egypt, away from our Patriarchate and our Pope, many define Orthodoxy in the way which they believe is right. Unfortunetly, it is these people who do most damage to our Church and its faith.

Orthodoxy is not ruling with an iron fist, but Orthodoxy is Christianity under the microscope. In order for it to be experienced to the fullest, it must be understood correctty. Orthodoxy is not being stubborn, but humble. Orthodoxy is showing respect to elders. Orthodoxy is being respectful to our fathers the priests, bishops, metropolitans, and our venerable father the Pope. Orthodoxy is hanging and preserving carefully every rite, practice, custom, order, teaching, and tradition, set by God, delivered through His apostles and handed down to us.

The Blessings And Rewards of Giving

"Give and it will be given to you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be put into your bosom. For with the same measure that you use, it will be measured back to you." (Luke 6:38)

Someone once said, "What motivates people to neglect health, lose family, and totally ignore their spiritual and eternal life in order to increase income? And when you ask how much is enough, the answer is, 'just a little more!"

Greed and accumulating money are selfish desires for more and more. You cannot violate the princilples of God's word without suffering the consequences.

The Psalmist had this in mind when he warned us that it is vain, unproductive, and worthless to rise early, retire late, and eat the bread of painful labors, that is, to wear ourselves out in the process. (Psalm 127:2) How foreign all of this is to the method Jesus explained for gaining what we need and what we desire in life.

Giving Is The Way To Receiving

Jesus said that giving is the way to reaceiving (Luke 6:38) When we examine this promise, notice that Jesus did not identify what we are to give. He simply says, "it." Jesus said this because it does not matter whether we give time, help, counsel, encouragement, money, loyalty, comfort, friendship mercy or love, the promise is still the same.

When we give, God multiplies our gift so that it comes back to us in a greater portion. "Good measure, pressed down, shaken together" refers both to the amount and the quality of it. There is no useless filler in God's return for our generosity and thoughtfulness toward others. "Running over" means that we will always receive more than we give and more than we expect.

While God assumes the responsibility of rewarding us for following His principle of giving, we choose the quality and the amount. "For by your standard of measure it will be measured to you in return." Again, the "it" refers to whatever you are giving. Jesus says that this return on your giving "will pour into your bosom." By whom? Many of those to whom you give may not be able to give in return. The channel through whom God returns the gifts is not your concern. You will seldom, if ever, be able to predict how God will honor your obedience to this amazingly profitable principle.

The world's system is "Get all you can." This approach gives you no promise of succeeding. God's way gives you His irevocable, unfailing promise of an abundant return. Following His principles, you get the best return on your investment.

According to St. Paul, the Lord Jesus said: "IT IS MORE BLESSED TO GIVE THAN TO RECEIVE." (Acts 20:35).

And according to the Book of Malachi, man will deserve curse instead of blessing, if he robbed God, but if he honored His commandment in giving the tithes, he will reap the fulfillment of His amazing promise," I will open for you the windows of heaven and pour out for you such blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it.." (Mal. 3:7-12).

This summer, athletes from around the world will gather in Barcelona, Spain, to compete in the 23rd Olympics. Male or female, they share the common denominators of desciplene, devotion and perseverance- qualities that Christians everywhere emulate in the quest for an enduring crown. A Christian magazine, named "Vertue", asked some Christian women who have gone for the gold as members of former U.S. Olympic teams to talk about how they integrate sport with their faith, the face for the holy crown. Here are their stories.

Just call Debbie Brown, a team player. As head coach of the women's volleyball team at Notre Dame University in Indiana, she emphasizes "pulling together to play the game." In childhood, she "played around with tennis and track"- solitary sports where she competed, alone, against an opponent.

"Really, I prefer sports that require being with people," she says. "Volleyball requires special team work: Good communication, respect for those next to you and a need to learn to get along."

In the 70's when athletic sholarships for women were rare, Debbie worked toward her goal of playing in the Olympics and was rewarded with a spot on the U.S. team. She moved to Colorado Springs in 1978, a few months after dedicating her life to the Lord Jesus through a friend.

For the next four years, Debbie devoted herself to volleyball: training, competing around the globe and eyeing the 1980 Olympics in Moscow. Later on, Debbie bacame an assistant coach for the women's 1988 volleyball team. As a Coach, Debbie strives to nurture a team spirit with Christian values: using love as the strongest motivator; leading her team in prayer; and treating women with respect, understanding and compassion.

My players watch me closely," she says. "They see the way I make my decisions, how I live

out my life."

When 8- Year-Old Nancy Marshall did a backhand-spring into a window and landed outside, her mother said, "We've got to get that girl in gymanstices before she ruins our house."

Six years later, in 1972, Nancy competed in the Munich Olympics. She was the youngest American at that time ever selected for the gymnastics team. When she talks to adults and women's groups, Nancy shares her Olympic experience: the joy of family support, how she was marked by companionship with athletes around the world. This past has shaped her future, Nancy says. It led her to pioneer in sports broadcasting as a female athletics analyst for NBC, and to write a book, encouraging athletes to use biblical principles to overcome emotional hurdles in athletics (like envy, doubt, strife and loneliness). It teaches you about life, to channel your energies, pursue excellence, deal with failure. Now when I face adversity, I remember how God worked in my life before, and I have confidence He will do the same again."

Kelly Lunda, 30, who was raised by a family of skaters in Madison, Wisconsin said: "I used to think that if i skated fast, people would like me and I'd be happy." Kelly sensed there was more to the meaning of life than achievements. She felt an emptiness that awards could not fill: "In high school, through young life, I realized only Jesus Christ could.'

In 1983, a second speedskating race in the Olympic trails left Kelly, then 22, devastated. She had placed second consistently throughout the year. Then in one quick minute, slipping on the ice, she was knocked from Olympic delegate to alternate. "My world fell apart. That was the hardest thing I've ever gone through." Only belief in Jesus and the hope of God's promises, glories to come in life eternal, kept her from a nervous breakdown, she says. Kelly never tires of sharing her hope through fellowship of Christian athletes and chapel services that she leads at the University of Washington in Seattle.

She openly tells of the victories and defeats that she once kept to herself and points all of this to a sustaining faith in Christ.

Now working as a physical therapist, Kelly has hung up her skates, but she continues to use the qualities she cultivated as a top athlete: discipline, energy, opitimism and prayer for her clients as well. "People think that winning a gold medal or becoming a corporate vice president or getting married will make them happy. But God taught me at an early age that only He can do that."

The Choice Is Ours By Dalia Atalla

Since the creation of man, God has given him the knowledge of right and wrong, and the free will to chose between them. The manner by which our Lord grants us free will is characterized by the story of the prodigal son (Luke 15).

God gave us certain gifts that we must explore and utilize with the help of the Holy Spirit in order to grow in knowledge and in spiritual life and produce good fruits. He gave us His great and infallible word which "is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the



man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work." (2 Timothy 3:16,17).

God gave us His Holy Spirit to guide us, His Body and Blood to dwell within us. He gave us His Church as the greatest institute and university in the world, "to conduct yourself in the house of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and ground of the truth." (1 Timothy 3:15). "He has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind." (2 Timothy 1:7).

Therefore, if we by our free will, misused this freedom, and chose not to benfit of these wonderful gifts, we are disobeying God, our great Father and creator, pulling away from Him, and thus we will be uprooted (see the parable of the unfruitful fig tree in Luke 13:6,7).

So, if we choose to refuse our gifts, we are refusing God, the path of righteousness, and ultimately our Citizenship in the Paradise, but the choice is ours.

Although God knows the outcome of our lives, and whether or not we will enter the Heavenly Jerusalem, He still provides us with the free will to choose the best choice, and helps us to make it.
