It depicts the 40-day-fast of Moses before receiving the word of God; The Ten Commandments, plus 3 days, which the church fasted in the ten's century and moved the Moquattam Mountain in Cairo, Egypt. May the Lord

grant us a blessed fast according to Isaiah 58 and Matthew 6. We need to pray much during this fast, for the salvation of America, Egypt and Syria and to re-move the mountains of evil and persecution.

#### 2. Thanksgiving Day (November 28):

On Thursday, Nov. 28, America celebrates Thanks-giving Day. St. John Church celebrates this day with a Liturgy (which is called the sacrament of Thanks-giving) from 8:0010:00-a.m. followed by breakfast, spiritual words and songs of thanksgiving.

# **Fasting**

(Excerpts from Pope Tawadros' Lecture)



The Coptic Orthodox Church is a church of fast and asceticism. We fast 196 days in the year. That shows the importance of fasting in the church, in the family and in life.

Fasting is an ancient commandment from the beginning of creation when God ordered Adam and Eve not to eat of one certain tree or else they would surely die (Gen. 2:17). But unfortunately they broke the commandment and fell in disobedience and death.

There is a commandment repeated in both the Old and the New Testaments, which says: "Man shall not life by bread alone but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (Deut. 8:3 & Matt. 4:4; Lk. 4:4). Therefore, to fast means to train yourself to resist sin and lust and to say NO to every evil deed or word or thought.

If we spoke about fast or the law of one wife; we are doing that out of love. St. Paul said, "If I give my body to be burned, but have not love, it prophets me nothing" (1 Cor. 13:3).

Fasting is a means and not a goal. In fasting we want to subject the body to the spirit and not the opposite, and by that we get the spiritual life.

Fasting is an opportunity to liberate yourself from the ego and selfishness.

Also, fasting is a spiritual worship that accompanies man all his life long. In Mathew 6, the Lord Jesus talked about the three pillars of Christianity, which are giving alms, prayer and fasting and they refer to our relationship with others, with God and with our bodies.

Fast brings joy, resists anger and enlarges the heart. It should be practiced in secret and it lifts up saints to heaven.

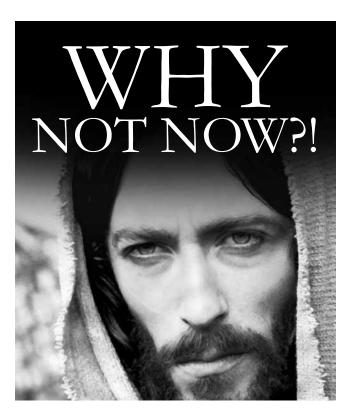

# What Is A Sober Mind?

"Exhort the young men to be sober-minded" (Titus 2:6)St. Peter also says, "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour" (1 Pet. 5:8). The ingredients of the word "sober" are: considerate- cautious- humble- self-denying- chasteserious.

#### 1. Considerate

You must be considerate and thoughtful, and not rash and heedless. To be sober-minded, is to make use of our reason, in reasoning with ourselves and in communing with our own hearts- to employ those noble powers and capacities, by which we are distinguished from, and dignified above the beasts, that we may not receive the grace of God in them in vain, but being rational creatures. You learned to talk when you were children, when will you learn to think seriously-to think to the purpose?

Floating thoughts your heads are full of, foreign and impertinent ones, when will you be brought to close and fixed thoughts, to think with concern and application of the great things that belong to your everlasting peace and welfare?

Learn to think not only of what is just before you, which strikes the senses, and affects the imagination, but of the cause and consequences, and reasons of things, to discover truths, to compare them with one another, to argue upon them and apply them to yourselves, and think which deserves to be first considered.

Inconsideration is the ruin of thousands, and many precious souls perish through mere carelessness. "Now therefore, thus says the Lord of hosts, consider your ways". Take time to think, desire to be alone now and then, and let not solitude and retirement be uneasiness to you, for you have a heart of your own that you may find talk with, and a God nigh unto you, with whom you may have a pleasing communion.

Learn to think freely; God invites you to do so: "Come now, and let us reason together" (Isa.1:18). We desire not you should take things upon trust, but inquire impartially into them, as the noble Bereans, who searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so which the apostles told them (Acts 17:10, 11).

Learn to think what you are, and what you are capable of; think who made you, and what you were made for; for what end you were endowed with the powers of reason, and attended by the inferior creatures; think what you have been doing since you came into the world- of the great work you were sent into the world about- of the vanity of childhood and youth- and how unavoidable the years of them are past away as a tale that is told- and whether therefore it be not time for you to begin to be religious and to enter in at the strait gate. Do nothing rashly, but always speak and act under the government of the great law of consideration. Ponder the path of your feet, that it may be a straight path. Some people take a pride in being careless, and so they glory in their shame. But be not you thus negligent....

#### 2. Cautious

You must be cautious, and prudent, and not willful and heady. The word in the text is the same that is rendered, ver. 5, to be discreet. You must not only think rationally, but when you have done so, you must act wisely, and so as will be most for your true interest; look before you, look under your feet, and pick your way, not as fools, but as wise. Those that govern themselves, God will guide, but will justly leave those that love to wander endlessly.

Put away childish follies with other childish things, and do not all your days think and speak as children. Therefore, in every case of moment and difficulty, be willing to be advised by wise friends, and depend more upon their judgment who have had longer experience of the world, than upon your own. Consult with those who are wise and good; ask them what they would do if they were in your case, ask your spiritual father and you will find safely, or if it should not prove well, it will be a satisfaction to you, that you did not do it without advice and deliberation.

What brighter character can be given of a young man, than to say, he is wise? Or what blacker, than to say, he is willful? See the former in Solomon, who calls himself a child (1 Kings 3:7), and yet his father calls him a wise man, that knows what he is to do. See the later in the character of the rebellious son, that was to be stoned to death, against whom the indictment runs thus, "He is stubborn, he will not obey the voice of his father and mother' (Deut.21:18-20). Those are the fools whom there is little hope of, that despise wisdom and instruction (Prov.1:7). He that will not be counseled, cannot be helpful. If you want to be sober and wise, study the Scriptures, by them you will get more understanding than the ancients, than all your teachers (Ps. 119:99,100).

Be earnest with God in prayer for wisdom, as Solomon was; and the prayer was both pleasing and prevailing in heaven. "If any-one lacks wisdom, let him ask of God who gives all liberally and without reproach, and it will be given to him" (James 1:5).

It is not a promise with a perhaps, but with assurance, 'it shall be given him'. To all true believers, Christ himself is, and shall be made of God, wisdom" (1 Cor.1:30).

#### 3. Humble

You must be humble and modest, and not proud and conceited. It is recommended to the younger to be clothed with humility (1 Pet.5:5), that is, to be sober-minded.

"Let no man think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but think soberly' (Rom.12:3). Keep up low thoughts of your-self both outward and inward; of your attainments and improvements, and all your performances, and all the things you call merits and excellencies. Boast not of a false gift, of what you have not; nor be puffed up with what you have. Does your face shine? Be as Moses was, he did not know that the skin of his face shone, remember your defects and infirmities. Learn from your Master who was lowly in heart (Matt.11:29).

#### 4. Self-denying

You must be temperate and self-denying, and not indulgent of your appetites. It is the same word in the text (sober), that in ver. 2 is translated temperate, and some think it properly signifies a moderate use of meat and drink, to save our mind from being clouded, and our wisdom from being corrupted, that is our hearts from being overcharged with drunkenness. We usually put a sober man in opposition to one that is drunk, or addicted to drunkenness. So, let us then warn young men to dread the sin of drunkenness; keep at a distance form it; avoid all appearances of it, and approach towards it. It has slain its thousands, its ten thousands, of young people; has ruined their health, brought diseases and shame upon them, and cut them off in the flower of their days. Take heed of the beginning of this sin, for the way of it is downhill; and many, under pretense of an innocent entertainment, and passing the evening in a pleasant conversation, are drown in to drink to excess, and make beasts of themselves, and you should tremble to think how fatal the consequences of it are, it extinguishes convictions and sparks of devotion and provokes the Spirit of grace to withdraw, and it will be the sinner's eternal ruin, if it be not repented of, because it is written "the drunkards shall not inherit the kingdom of God" (1 Cor. 6:10).

#### 5. Chaste

You must be chaste and not wanton and impure. "The lusts of the flesh which are manifest, adultery, fornication, uncleanness..." are called youthful lusts. "Flee youthful lusts" (2 Tim.2:22). For God's sake, and for your own precious soul's sake, flee these youthful lusts; dread them as you would a devouring fire, or a destroying plague, and keep at a distance from them; 'Abstain form all appearances of these sins; "hating even the garment defiled by the flesh" (Jude: 23).

+ Covet not to know these depths of Satan, but take a pride in being ignorant of the way of the adulterous woman. See all temptations to uncleanness coming from the unclean spirit, that roaring lion who goes about seeking to devour

- + Remember what the apostle prescribes, as that which ought to be the constant care of the unmarried, to be holy both in body and spirit, and so to please the Lord" (1 Cor. 7:34). Solomon warns the youth of entangling in the snares of the evil woman! (See Proverbs 6, 7).
- + Pray earnestly to God for His grace to keep you from this sin, and that the temptation never be sudden, but find you awake, and aware of it, and armed against it with the whole armor of God.
- + Get your heart purified by the word of God, and sanctified by divine love.

#### 6. Serious

You must be serious, and not frothy and vain. This meaning we commonly give to the word here used. Him that is serious, we call a sober man; and put this last of the ingredients of this sober-mindedness, because it will have a very great influence upon all the rest.

Not that we would oblige young people never to be merry, or had any ill-natured design upon them to make them melancholy; no, religion allows them to be cheerful; it is your time, make your best of it, evil days will come, of which you will say you have no pleasure in them, when the cares and sorrows of this world increase upon you and we would not have you to anticipate those evil days.

It is mentioned as an instance of the promised prosperity and flourishing state of Jerusalem, that the streets of the city shall be full of boys, and girls playing in the streets thereof (Zech.8:5). Solomon says, "Go your way, eat with joy, and drink with a merry heart, for God now accepts your work" (Eccl.9:7).

God expects to be served by us with "joyfulness and with gladness of heart, for the abundance of all things" (Deut.28:47).

The merry heart does good like a medicine. The holy heavenly life, spent in the service of God, and in communion with Him, is without doubt the most pleasant, comfortable, fruitful, powerful and secure life any one can live in this world.

#### HOW TO BUILD A LASTING

# SUCCESSFUL MARRIAGE (3)

In order to have a successful marriage I must never deliberately do anything to cause my spouse pain or discomfort.

#### 9- Achieving Home Privacy:

Both Husband and wife must keep the privacy of their mutual home and personal lives. This should start from the first day of their marital life. All their future plans must be kept in secret. Their style of life and their financial matters must be only discussed between them. Also their disputes and their problems must be solved between them in secret, without the interference of family members, relatives or friends. Family members and relatives are usually bias to the spouse related to them, and the problems will be intensified. The priest or the father of confession only can share with them the problems, if they cannot solve them by themselves.

For successful marriage, the couples must not do everything with their parents, or visit them whenever they have free time. If one of the spouses, usually the wife, spends all her free time with her parents, Dr. Harley considered that this is a symptom of separation anxiety. The husband will not agree that they do everything with her parents, or spend every weekend or every other night with them. He will not be happy to do that, and will consider it wearing, and he will plan to break away from her parents, because their privacy is not existent. She must schedule time to be alone with her husband. Some wives who are too dependent on their parents, and feel that they cannot be separated from them, would not give undivided attention to their husbands.

When the husbands feel that their privacy is always violated by their wives' parents, they may react unwisely and attack their in-laws. Others may be frustrated and plan to move to another city or state, against the will of their wives.

A husband suffered from the interference of his in-laws in the privacy of his home, to the extent that they wrecked his marriage, he complained several times, but there was no response from his wife. He found that he was swallowed into the family of his wife, so he looked for a job in another state in order to have privacy and quality time with his wife. The wife got disappointed, because she would not be able to see her parents. But, for the sake of protecting their marriage, she exigently obeyed, especially when he told her that there will be an increase in his salary. Although the wife violated the policy for successful marriage, despite the complains and the annoyance of her husband, he also made two mistakes. He violated the policy of honesty, as he did not explain to his wife what he was planning. He also violated the policy of protection by demanding that they move to another state; i.e. he manipulated his wife, and this usually causes lasting resentment, because she was forced to do something against her will. It is not right for a spouse, to violate any policy, in order to resolve a problem, created by a policy being violated by the other spouse.

#### 10- Conflicts caused by relatives and friends:

For successful marriage, the couples must consider the problems that may happen by the interference of relatives and friends. Your spouse is your most important friend and relative. The conflicts may happen for the following rea-

- 1- The interference of relatives or friends uncovers the privacy of the family.
- 2- Dictator parents try to control the newly married couple. One of the spouses may not be in harmony with the inlaws, but for the sake of peace, hides his/her feelings. This causes pressure and stress.
- 3- Some spouses believe that there is nothing wrong with continuing a friendship with a former lover after marriage. It is not right, and it may lead to several problems.
- 4- Having some close friends, disliked by the spouse. This will cause a serious marital conflict and will cause great hurt to the spouse.
- 5- Liking his/her spouse's friend too much, without keeping a distance in relations; such as uncovering the mistakes of his/her spouse, or complaining from some problems or abuses. This may lead to fall in love with that friend, especially if he/she shows sympathy for her/him.
- 6- Financially helping my family secretly without telling my

spouse. This is violation against the policy of honesty.

- 7- Inviting one of the relatives to live with the couple at home without the approval of the spouse. Sometimes the spouse does not tolerate the situation, and does not show hospitality to that relative, and so problems start.
- 8- Talking on the phone with a relative or a friend for a long time, while the spouse is at home. This is violation against the policies of protection and care.

A wife met her girlfriend after a long time and she discovered that she had become a widow. She invited her friend to live in an apartment near her home, and in order to give her pleasant company, she invited her several times to share dinner with them at home. The husband helped that widow with some house repairs, and he enjoyed her company. After some months, he fell in love with her. He did not tell his wife, but he told the friend. After a short time, he was doing more than enjoying her company. This went on for over a year before his wife caught them. Both were ashamed and begged her forgiveness, but she could not be consoled. He shared with the friend a disaster that ruined their marriage. The following marital policies were broken:

- 1- Honesty; and the result of disloyalty was a marital disas-
- 2- Protection; as his affair with his wife's friend inflicted unbearable pain for his wife, because of selfish behavior.
- 3- Care; as he did not care to please his wife and give her quality time and undivided attention.

#### 11- Knowing the Nature of My Spouse:

There are many spouses who do not know the nature of their partners, but they love each other. In order to build a lasting and successful marriage, each spouse should know the nature of his/her spouse. God created Eve from Adam's rib (near his heart), as a human being, but with a different nature than man in many aspects. Many psychologists and socialists investigated these differences and summed them as follows:

1- Man is mono directed, while woman is stereo directed.

Man cannot do many things in the same time, while woman can do many things efficiently in the same time. She can speak on the phone, watch her kids, and cook the food in the same time efficiently. If her husband tries to do these three jobs, the food will be burnt and the kids will harm themselves.

Because of this difference, man has a small wallet in his

pocket, while woman carries a purse (hand bag) containing different items; such as telephone number book, makeup tools, first aid kit, and other special things, besides money and credit cards.

Thus in marital life, she has a wide scope, and she is more efficient in doing certain jobs than her husband. When the two spouses plan to go on a trip, the wife is more efficient in preparing the luggage, without forgetting any item may be needed by every person in the family. If her husband interferes and asks his wife to do this job, he will prepare one luggage and may forget some items, even his shaving machine

2- Statically women normally speak more than double the words men speak per day.

This nature is clearer in the infants. Usually girls start to speak earlier than boys, and their vocabulary is much more. In marital life, the wife normally speaks more than double the amount of words her husband speaks. This difference has an impact on their daily relations.

In successful marriage, the two spouses must always consider this nature, especially in discussing their problems and disputes. The husband must not be annoyed or offended when his wife speaks much or argues for a long time. As good communication is the key of successful marriage, the wife has to minimize her speech as much as possible in discussing problems, and stop repeating the same words; otherwise her husband will not stand the conversation, and he will withdraw gradually. He will feel uncomfortable during that discussion. Wives must choose the proper time for speaking with their husbands, and they should do it briefly. In marital life, problems usually happen when wives are very talkative and husbands are short tempered.

In successful marriage, husbands should consider the nature of their wives. They practice patience and listen seriously, without showing any discomfort or weariness. When they find their wives repeating the same words, or the same thing in different wording, they should listen and pay attention showing their concern. If they feel that they are tired from long discussion, they kindly ask their wives to postpone the matter to a more convenient time; a better time to think seriously about that matter. One of the greatest gifts a person can have is the gift of listening. It is an act of love and caring. Listening will appear in the eyes and the smiles of the husband. Many men do not have sufficient vocabulary to express their emotions. Some husbands think that expressing these feelings in words is weakness, and they keep silent at home, like the Sphinx. Others keep quiet to avoid confrontation, when there is difference in opinion.

# The Sins of the Pharisees

Jesus's most frequent opponents were the Pharisees. The Pharisees were early rabbis who called Israel to follow God's law, so that the Lord would return to Jerusalem and defeat Israel's enemies. They were considered to be stricter and more passionate about following God's law than anyone else. So why did they clash so much with Jesus?

There are four major reasons that Jesus and the Pharisees clashed. First is that the Pharisees were hypocrites. They followed the details of the law, but they failed to be true to God in their hearts, especially when it came to money and possessions. Second, the Pharisees trusted in their religious and ceremonial laws more than in the root of God's law, which is to love others and to do good for them. Third, the Pharisees judged others based on what groups they were associated with, which caused them to avoid people from other religious groups (like Samaritans and Gentiles) and those they considered sinners (like tax collectors and prostitutes). And finally, the Pharisees failed to recognize the work of the Holy Spirit in the things that Jesus and his followers were doing. Let's take a closer look at each of these controversies. The Pharisees were hypocrites, especially regarding money Jesus calls the Phariees "hypocrites" over a dozen times. But what are they hypocritical about?

More than anything else, the Pharisees were hypocritical in how they used their money. Though they followed the laws for giving, they were still "lovers of money" (Luke 16:14). They tithed the smallest things, but they neglected the justice and mercy that matter most to God. (Matthew 23:23, Luke 11:42-44) They gave alms to be seen by others instead of in secret where only God would know (Matthew 6:2-4). They did the right religious things to do look good, but their personal lives were full of greed and self-indulgence (Matthew 23:25, Luke 11:37-41).

After Jesus warned his disciples about "the hypocrites" three times in Matthew 6, he told them not to store up treasures on earth, but to focus on heavenly treasures instead (Matthew 6:19-21). When Jesus warned his disciples of the hypocrisy of the Pharisees in Luke 12, he followed it by explaining that they needed to beware of greed, and instead

trust God to take care of them. Rather than trying to be rich and store up many possessions, we need to be rich towards God (Luke 12:15-21). Rather than striving to make more money, we need to sell our things and give the money to the poor (Luke 12:22-34).

The need to get rid of the possessions that can take our hearts in mentioned eleven times in the gospels (Matthew 6:19-21, 19:21, 19:29; Mark 10:21, 10:29; Luke 12:15-21, 12:33, 14:33, 18:22, 18:29, 19:8-10). The community of Acts obeyed Jesus by selling their possessions and giving the proceeds to those in need (Acts 2:45, 4:32) John told his fellow Christians that "If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person?" (1 John 3:17).

The Pharisees were very good at following the "rules" of religion, even the rules of giving, but their hearts and their actions still showed that their own money was a greater priority. If they cared about keeping their possessions more than about having mercy on the people in need, how could the love of God be in them?

Unfortunately, St. John Chrysostom pointed out that this hypocrisy can be found within the church:

"We who are disciples of Christ claim that our purpose on earth is to lay up treasures in heaven. But our actions often believe our words. Many Christians build for themselves fine houses, lay out splendid gardens, construct bathhouses, and buy fields. It is small wonder, then, that many pagans refuse to believe what we say. 'If their eyes are set on mansions in heaven," they ask, "why are they building mansions on earth? If they put their words into practice, they would give away their riches and live in simple huts.'

....When the pagans accuse us of hypocrisy, many of us should plead guilty."

- St. John Chrysostom, from "On Living Simply".

And St. Basil the Great attested:

"I know many who fast, pray, sigh, and demonstrate every manner of piety, so long as it costs them nothing, yet would not part with a penny to help those in distress. Of what profit to them is the remainder of their virtue? The Kingdom of Heaven does not receive such people, for 'it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the Kingdom of God."

Pray that God may help us to avoid the hypocrisy of the Pharisees, especially when it comes to the place of possessions in our heart.

# Egypt's Mina Danial

# The untold story of a revolutionary





One year after the Maspero massacre, where 27 protesters were killed during clashes with Egypt's army,

Ahram Online pays tribute to the Egyptian activist slain at the age of 20

Tarek El-Tayeb, 25, had always hated Christians. He was known among his friends as Tarek "El-Salafi" as he followed the ultraorthodox school of Islam. "I joined the Salafist school of Islam when I was 13 years old," remembers El-Tayeb. "According to my ideology, Christians were heretics and being a friend with any of them was a grave sin." All of this changed when he met Coptic Christian activist Mina Danial. The two bumped into each other in Cairo's iconic Tahrir Square during last year's 18-day uprising. They met the morning after the 28 January "Friday of Rage", when Hosni Mubarak's security forces fired tear gas, rubber bullets and live ammunition at protesters. Danial had been shot in the leg.

"Are you injured?" asked El-Tayeb. "Yes," laughed Mina. "But it's not a big deal." it's not ok," responded El-Tayeb. "You need to clean that wound."

Tayeb insisted and took Mina to the nearby Qasr Al-Eini Hospital. After that, the two, became inseparable. "Mina and I didn't go through the normal stages of friendship," remembers El-Tayeb. "After the first few minutes we became like brothers." Despite the closeness of the two, El-Tayeb still struggled to overcome his discomfort at having a Christian friend. "I never told him how I felt about Christians," says El-Tayeb. "He would sometimes tell me that he loved me and I would respond by saying that I hate him. It was just hard for me to get rid of these fanatical ideas all at once. It took time.

becoming a Salafist, El-Tayeb made sure he was civil to his Christian neighbors and colleagues, however, being friends with a Christian was simply out of the question. Danial was different. "I just could not hate him. For the first time in my life, I found that I could not hate a Christian. I could not put this barrier of religion between me and him," El-Tayeb explains, "I didn't understand what is it about Danial that made him have this impact on people?" Mina was special, his friends say, unique, charismatic and impossible to hate. He was a cheerful young man, who was always smiling and had the uncanny ability to win people over.

Mina, the youngest of seven, was born in the town of Sanabo in the Upper Egyptian governorate of Assiut. He was raised mainly by his sister Mary, 21 years his senior. He was so close to Mary that he called her "mum." "He was born at ten in the morning," recalls Mary, who looks strikingly similar to her brother, smiling at the memory. "He was such a beautiful child. For me, he was a son and not a brother." The Danials were the only Christian family in a street of Muslims. Life was good initially, Muslims and Christians got along well, says Mary. However things changed in the mid-1980s when sectarian tension began to spread throughout Egypt, as ultraorthodox Islamic groups gained influence. Life for Christians changed forever. Fundamentalist groups had succeeded in filling people's minds with hate."

Slowly, the gap between Muslims and Christians increased, Mary says. Attacks on Christian homes became common. The Daniels were not spared: several members of the Daniel family were attacked. Mary recalls stones being hurled at her when she walked to church. One day, a member of the Danial family got into a fight with an Islamist, after the latter demanded that he turn off the Christian Mass that was playing on the radio. The fight escalated and the family went to lodge a complaint at the local police station. They were shocked when the police responded by arresting nine members of the Danial family instead. "The fact that they arrested us just because we complained opened my eyes and made me realize that the regime was collaborating with these fanatics," explains Mary. By the time Mina was born in 1991, the damage to Muslim and Christian relations had already been done.

The Christians now lived in what Mary called "Church isolation." "The church became a state within a state," says Mary. "It ran supermarkets, hospitals, clubs, picnics, lectures, everything. Our whole life became centered around the church." The violence continued. When Mina was two years old, the family decided to pack up and head to Cairo. They settled in the suburb of Ezzbet El-Nakhl, where Mina lived until his death. A quiet child, he spent most of his time with his sister Mary, who used to take him, along with his other sister Sherry, who was four years older than him, to church. "Everyone at church envied me for having him. He was so quiet and sensitive. He never whined and would not ask me to buy him anything because he would worry that I would not have enough money."

Proud of his Pharaonic heritage, Mina dreamed of studying archeology one day, and then he opted for a Bachelor of Commerce instead. "In his teens, Mina slowly began to get involved in politics.

Physically, he copied Guevara; the hair and clothes were styled after his hero. Politically, he leaned towards the left. However, it was Guevara's quest for social justice that gripped Mina the most. His close friend, Ramez Sobhy, says that Mina was impressed by the revolutionary leader's struggle to help the poor. "People always think of Mina as a Christian martyr but that is not true. Mina was a martyr of the poor.

It is not difficult to understand why. The misery in Ezzbet El-Nakhl, where Mina lived, Cairo is devastating. Roads that lead to Mina's house are dusty and broken; the buildings are rundown. A few roads away from his house, young children play on a swing, precariously balanced over a titanic pile of rubbish and rubble. Mina was not looking for a way out for himself only, he wanted a collective solution that would benefit all of Egypt's poor. He began encouraging his friends to go on trips to Egypt's underprivileged areas to talk to the people and discuss possible solutions for their problems. He attended meetings held by various political movements in Egypt but none satisfied him. "Mina did not trust these political groups. He felt that Egypt's poor should unite and help each other and fight for their rights." After the 2010 Nagaa-Hamadi attack, during which armed gunmen killed eight Christian worshippers as they were emerging from a Christmas Mass, Mina's activism amplified. He joined the Justice and Freedom Movement, a youth group that was calling for change. Despite being heartbroken over the deteriorating situation for Christians in Egypt, friends say, Mina did not have sectarian tendencies. He always believed that the Christian problem was part of the bigger Egyptian problem.

"Whenever sectarian problems take place, he would ask

me, why do they always happen in poor places, why do we never hear of Muslims and Christians fighting in rich areas like Zamalek?" Sobhy adds.

Mina resented Christian-only protests and sit-ins. He would tell his friends that carrying crosses and chanting Christian slogans might discourage Muslims from participating. He believed that unity was the key. In one incident that Sobhy recalls, the residents of Cairo's working-class district Bulak clashed with Christians who were protesting against discrimination. Mina went to talk to them. "He told them, why are you fighting each other? Both Muslims and Christians are poor, both can't find proper housing, both are suffering," says Sobhy. "In the end, the Muslims joined the Christians in the protest. Mina had that kind of charisma. His effect on people was monumental. When he talked, people listened."

Military vehicles charge at protesters in front of Maspero TV headquarters (Photo: Reuters) Tragedy struck again on New Year's Eve in 2011, when a bomb exploded in the Two Saints Church, Sts. Peter and Paul, in Alexandria minutes after midnight, killing 25 Coptic civilians. That night Mina drove to Alexandria."He saw the shredded bodies; he saw a human scalp hanging on an iron rod," remembers Mary. "He was in shock. He refused to eat for a week after that."

When the January 25 Revolution took off, Mina and his friends joined the mass sit-in on Tahrir Square. Mina was renowned for being fearless: he would often be seen fighting the security forces on the front lines. As a result, he was repeatedly wounded. He was shot in the leg with a live bullet and suffered countless other injuries across his body. When Mubarak stepped down on 11 February, Mina, who had gone home to change his clothes, rushed to the flashpoint square and danced with his sister. However, the situation in Egypt did not improve. On 9 March, just weeks after the military council assumed power, the army forcibly dispersed a Tahrir Square sitin. Churches were attacked and torched. Egypt's political dialogue began to change. Islamists, denouncing Christians as heretics, gathered support. However, Mina was an eternal optimist, his friends said. "Whenever we felt demoralized or sad, we would call him," says Sobhy. "He would give us an energy boost." He continued to attend all the post-uprising protests, which

> demanded the fulfillment of the revolution's demands. Early April, he joined a mass pro-

test calling for ousted president Mubarak, who at the time was still free and living in the Red Sea resort Sharm El-Sheikh, to be put on trial. This is where Mina met the love of his life, Katherine. Katherine, like Mina, came from a conservative Upper Egyptian Christian family. She works as a tour guide and lives in Cairo. A few months after they met, Mina told

Katherine of a nightmare he had. He dreamed that black dogs were attacking him, trying to kill him. The dream occurred on 9 October, 2010. Mina died on 9 October, 2011. "I knew that Mina was going to die and so he did," says Katherine. "We both felt it." Attacks on Copts escalated and several sit-ins protesting the increased discrimination towards the Christian community were violently dispersed. Finally, on 9 October last year, activists decided to hold a peaceful protest. The march was to begin in the central Cairo' Shubra Square and would then head to Egyptian state media headquarters, Maspero. There was no plan for an open sit-in that day. The goal was to reach the radio and television building, make their demands heard and then leave. People began gathering in Shubra at 4pm. There were many activists but just as many women, children and elderly people. That day, Mina had lunch with his sister and Katherine, before heading to the protest. He and Katherine walked at the front, while Mary remained at the back. The march continued peacefully for an hour until unknown assailants began hurling stones at the protesters. At that point, a panicked Mary tried to call her brother repeatedly. Finally, after several attempts, he picked up. "He told me that he was ok and not to worry," says Mary, "that was the last conversation we had." Katherine, who was with Mina at the frontline, says that he was in a really good mood. "The closer we got to Maspero, the better his mood became," Katherine recalls. However, once the march reached Maspero, the army attacked the demonstrators, using an unprecedented level of force. Tear gas and live ammunition were fired. Army trucks ran over protesters, mutilating and killing those in the way. Mary, who had also reached Maspero, described the horror scene. "To say they were brutal would be an understatement," she says. "I remember that an army truck was trying to run us over. We ran onto the pavement in

an attempt to escape them, so the truck driver drove over the pavement in order to get us." The injured and the dead began to fill up the nearby Coptic hospital. Katherine, still with Mina, could no longer control her terror. "My legs began to shake with fear," she says. "So Mina told me that if I was that scared then I better leave. He carried me out of the Maspero area and took me to my father. He told us to take care of each other and left." Fifteen minutes later Mina was gunned down. He was shot in the shoulder with a single bullet. He was just 20 vears old. His friends informed his sister and fiancé of his death. Mary visited her brother's body at the Coptic hospital where the dead were laid out and was surprised that even in death, he was still smiling. "The fact that he was still smiling made me believe that Mina is not dead. That his dreams will never die."She kissed him, soaked a cloth in some of his blood and left.

"I sat beside him for two hours and held his hands," his Muslim friend, El-Tayeb says. "I wouldn't leave until a mutual friend of ours dragged me out." After his death, Mina became one of the icons of the revolution. His face has become a common feature in most revolutionary murals. Demonstrators wear masks of his face or hold aloft placards of his image during marches. Both President Mohamed Morsi and his rival regime-figure Ahmed Shafik used Mina's image as part of their presidential electoral campaigns. To date, no one has been found responsible for the deaths of the 27 protesters, killed on 9 October. "The Muslim Brotherhood, for one, are all hypocrites," fumes El-Tayeb. "On a personal level they call Mina a heretic, but publicly, they claim that he is a martyr." El-Tayeb has abandoned Salafism since Mina's death. He now considers himself a "moderate Egyptian Muslim." He is proud that he now has many Christian friends. "Mina opened the door for me. He taught me what humanity meant," says El-Tayeb. "He opened my eyes and I finally saw Christians as they really are: good people, kind, charitable and not corrupt as the extremists claimed." As for Mina, everyone loved him. "How can a man win so many hearts, unless God loves him?" asks El-Tayeb. "There is only one Mina."
