In celebrating Christmas, we must know these facts:



When I was a small boy, I asked my mother once to open the door of the wire net dividing the chicken in our garden, to see the cockfighting. THE LETTER OF JAMES By Fr. Augustine



THE BOOK OF JAMES

The letter of James is the book of Christian works, and of practical spiritual life.

Faith without works cannot be called faith. Faith without works is dead (2:26) and a dead faith is worse than no faith at all. Faith must work; it must produce; it must be visible and tangible through works. Verbal faith is not enough; mental faith is insufficient. Faith must inspire action.

Throughout James epistle to Jewish believers, he integrates true faith and everyday practical expeirience by stressing that true faith must manifest itself in works of faith.

<u>Faith indures trials.</u> Trials come and go, but a strong faith will face them head-on and develop endurance. Faith and patience are twins, as faith and works are also twins. Faith understands temptations. It will not allow us to consent to our lust and slide in sin. Doubt is the enemy of faith and prayer.

Faith obeys the Word of God (1:21-25). It will not merely hear and not do. Faith produces doers. The Word is likened by a mirror to reflect the inside. Faith removes discrimination and harbors no prejudice. For James, faith and favoritism cannot coexist and mercy triumphs over judgment (chapter 2).

<u>Faith displays itself in works, not in words</u>. Faith is more than mere words; it is more than knowledge; it is demonstrated by obedience; and it overtly responds to the promises of God.

<u>Faith controls the tongue</u> (chapter 3), this small but immensely powerful part of the body must be held in check.

<u>Faith acts wisely (1:5 & 3:13-18)</u>. It gives us the ability to choose wisdom that is heavenly and to shun wisdom that is earthly.

<u>Faith produces separation from the world and submission to God.</u> It provides us with the ability to resist the devil and humbly draw near to God.

Faith waits patiently for Christ's return (5:7-9) as the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth.

Faith prays for the afflicted, the sick and t' = sinners (5:13-20). Faith does miracles through prayer (3:17) gives healing and forgiveness.

ORTHODOXY

Is Orthodoxy a mere branch of Christianity? Is it merely confined to Oriental Cultures? It is a label for the practice of Rites and Traditions? Orthodoxy is often misunderstood and misrepresented particularly in the West. It is commonly misperceived that the Orthodox Churches are deeply attached to traditions, trapped by cultural practices and tied up by language [Coptic, Arabic, Greek, etc. . .).

Orthodoxy, however knows not such boundaries for it transcends culture and language. It is an inseparable component of the Christian Faith and when correctly understood and properly practiced it is immensely enriching and edifying.

The word ORTHODOXY has the double meaning of ORTHO = Right and DOXA = Glorification; thus its the Church which Glorifies Him with Right Worship. Orthodoxy therefore is a living continuity of the Christian faith with strong Apostolic Roots. Its characterized by a profound treasury of spirituality built upon spirituality well as traditional foundations.

With over 300 Churches today many youth ask why is the Orthodox Church so conservative? In comparing it with other denominations, a writer used the following parable: "A master departed leaving his teachings to his three disciples. The eldest faithfully preserved all the teachings changing nothing. Of the two others, one added to the teachings and the other took away from it. At his return the master without being angry with anyone said to the younger disciples, 'thank your older brother, without him you

would not have preserved the truth which I handed to you.' Then he said to the eldest, 'Thank your younger brothers, without them you would not have appreciated and understood the truth entrusted to you."

Orthodoxy is often misrepresented as being too steeped in traditions.

Tradition is not a parrot like repetition of prayers, readings and Rites. It is not something Mechanical, a dull process of handing down what has been received. Tradition is not static but dynamic; a living experience of the Holy Spirit in the present. Tradition is not only kept by the Church, it lives in the Church, it is the life of the Holy Spirit in the Church. Tradition, writes, Fr. Tadros Yacoub Malaty, is the living stream of the one life of the Church which brings up the past with all its aspects as a living present.

An American Protestant Minister who attended a Coptic Orthodox Christening in Dallas, Texas in 1971 said to Fr. Tadros Malaty: "During this long Baptismal Rite, I felt that I am living in the Apostolic age." Such a remark encapsulates the essence of tradition. The Orthodox Church is characterized by a unique sense of living continuity with the Apostolic Church. It sees itself as Heir and Guardian to a great treasure of spiritual inheritance, received from the past and believes it is her duty to transmit, this inheritance unimpaired to the future.

The Blessed Abba Antony the Great

Father of all Monks

The story of the blessed man Abba Antony is one which is full of great battles between the forces of good and evil which constantly war within our weak human nature. His life is one of victory over sin and its master. His life is one of humility, self asceticism, self denial, vigilance, the true life of monasticism and at the same time and in so many ways it is the ideal Christian life.

When the Enemy, the hater of the virtues and the lover of evil things, saw all this great perfection in Abba Antony, he could not endure it. At the beginning of his temptings of the saint he approached him with flattery, and cast into him anxiety as to his possessions, and his love for his sister, and for his family and his friends, and the love of money and lust of various kinds, and the thought of the rest of the life of the world, and finally the hard and laborius life which he lived and the weakness of the body which would be a source of his suffering with the lapse of time.

Now when the Enemy saw that his craftiness in this matter was without profit, and that the more he brought temptation unto Saint Antony, the more strenuous the saint was in protecting himself against him with the armour of righteousness, he attacked him by mean of the vigour of early manhood which is bound up in the nature of our humanity. With the passions he used to trouble him by night, and in the daytime also he would distress him and pain him with the

same to such a degree that even those who saw him knew that he was waging war against the adversary. The more the Evil one brought unto him filthy and maddening thoughts, the more Saint Antony took refuge in prayer and in abundant supplication, and he remained blameless.

At times, Satan would appear to him in the form of a woman, but the blessed Antony knelt down upon his knees on the ground, and prayed before Him Who said, "before they call, I will answer" (Isa. 65:24), and said, "O my Lord, this I entreat You, let not Your love be removed from my mind, and behold, I am, by Your Grace, innocent before You." And again the enemy multiplied in him the thoughts of lust, until Saint Antony became as one who was being burned up by lusts, but he would immediately put on his mind the thought of the judgement, and of the torture of Hell which is never-ending. But although the blessed Antony saw the Enemy made powerless he never boasted in spirit or let the thoughts of self -righteousness get hold of him. He knew that the enemy would return thus he kept vigil and his body under subjection to the will of freedom. Saint Antony kept in mind the importance of self denial and day by day he added to his toiling and increased his former work of asceticism and patient endurance. May his blessings be with us all. From The Coptic Encyclopedia:

St. Hilaria

Saint Hilaria was the elder daughter of the fourth century emperor Zeno; who had two daughters. Hilaria, sought the monastic life but Theopiste, the younger, did not share such desires. Hilaria secretly, in male attire, traveled to Alexandria, where she prayed in the Churches of Saint Peter the Martyr and Saint Mark the Evangelist. The apostles answered her in the affirmitive through the words of scripture. She then entrusted herself to Theodorus the deacon, who accompanied her to the monastery. She went first to Saint Menas, then to SCETIS to Saint PAMBO. The ascetic did not recognize her as a woman, for she was only eighteen, and he adviced her to go to ENATON, where life is less strict. But she insisted on staying, and earned monastic habit.

Three years later, Pambo learned through revelation that Hilaria is a woman and asked her to not reveal herself, in order to avoid scandle. Nine years later, still being beardless, she became known as Hilarion.

A demon entered her young sister, who is at Constantinople. The Emperor Zeno, not knowing what to do, left the matter to the monks of Scetis. As a consequence, Theopiste was brought before Saint Pambo. To everyone's astonishment, Hilarion's reaction is extreme; she drenched the ground with a flood of tears. Touched by such

compassion, St. Pambo entrusted the afflicted young woman to Hilarion. For a week the latter prayed consoling and finally curing her young sister, who did not recognize her. Once cured, Theopiste received the sacraments and returned to her father in the palace. She told the emperor that, to comfort her, Hilarion the monk kissed her on the mouth and slept in the same bed with her.

Shocked, Emperor Zeno summoned the healing monk to come to him on the excuse that there is another cure to be done at Constantinople. Taking Hilarion aside, Zeno disclosed that his mind is troubled. To avoid any scandle, Hilarion unveiled herself to the emperor alone, provided he lets her go back in peace to her monastery. For an hour the emporor remained stupefied. Only the empress and the younger sister were informed. The recognition resulted in tender tears.

Hilaria again became Hilarion in the monaster of Scetis, and twelve years later she died. Pambo then wrote the life of the saint, who was buried fully clothed.

The Coptic Orthodox Church remembers the great Saint Hilaria on: 21 Tubah, the date of her departure from this world. May her blessings be with us all. Amen.
