

3. Feast of Pentecost (June 4):





THE PAPAL ENCYCLICAL OF THE GLORIOUS FEAST OF THE RESURRECTION, 2017

Ekhristos Anesti, Alithos Anesti. Christ is risen. Truly, He is risen



I congratulate you for the Glorious Feast of Resurrection. This year, all Christians worldwide are celebrating it in unisons. We remember the martyrs of Palm Sunday. With their blood, they recorded a new page in the history of our Egyptian Coptic Orthodox Church. We remember them with all goodness as the Lord had chosen them. We know that God is the Pantocrator. He governs all our lives. We always thank Him saying 'let us give thanks to the beneficent one.' We remember them with all the martyrs. We remember our beloved country Egypt entreating the Lord to keep her in all peace. May He remove all evil and shadows of evil from the borders of our country Egypt, and of all the regions of the Middle East.

When we meditate on the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, we find in the Holy Bible many verses concerning the resurrection. The resurrection is the first and main event in the history of our Christianity. Without resurrection or the cross, Christianity could not exist. One of the many verses that discuss the resurrection in a personal perspective was written by a saint who had not known Christ for a long time, perhaps until middle age. In his adulthood, Christ had appeared to him and introduced Himself. This encounter changed him from Saul of Tarsus to St. Paul the Apostle. In his epistle to the Philippians, while in the prison, he wrote one of the strongest verses about experiencing the resurrection in chapter 3, verse 10. 'That I may know Him and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being conformed to His death.' (Philippians 3: 10). This knowledge and spiritual experience of the resurrection is illustrated through four features by St. Paul.

First: 'That I may know Him'. This is a confirmatory statement. This knowledge is personal and not by hearsay. This knowledge is through experiencing Christ personally. To verify this, he said 'That I may know Him'. Job the righteous spoke about this knowledge at the conclusion of the book of Job saying: "I have heard of You by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees You." (Job 42: 5). Through this knowledge man knows the love of Christ, the commandments of Christ, the salvation of Christ, the behavior of Christ which He placed in our hearts. This knowledge is by experience.

Second: "And the power of His resurrection". This is the second feature St. Paul mentioned. The resurrection has a power. This power is stronger than anything. The resurrection is not a historical event but a functional status for man to live by, experience and enjoy. The resurrection confirms that death is not the end of the road. It was the resurrection that raised Mary Magdalene when she was in doubt. While in her sadness, she thought that Christ was the gardener. When He called her by name, she joyfully greeted Him.

The resurrection alleviated the disciples from their fear. They had been terrified and kept all doors shut. When the Lord Jesus Christ appeared to them, the Bible says: 'Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord.' (John 20: 20). Resurrection raises man from sin. Man cannot rise from the impurity of sin except by the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ that pleased all mankind when

He was crucified and died on the cross for the sake of all.

Third: 'And the fellowship of His sufferings'. This is the third feature in the experience of St.


Paul. Here we wonder why he mentioned the power of resurrection before the fellowship of His sufferings. In ancient Christian tradition, whenever the cross was hung, they did not depict the body of the Lord Jesus. The reason being that Christ had risen from the dead. The joy of the resurrection is a road through the cross. But Christ is risen now. I remember during one of my visits abroad; I saw a wooden cross with the resurrected Jesus portrayed. Christ is present with the body that resurrected from the dead. The fellowship of His sufferings' that is described by St. Paul means that resurrection comes after suffering. The fellowship of sufferings happens when man shares it. There is no glory without pain. There is no crown of life without the crown of thorns. The crown of thorns gave us the crown of life. There is no resurrection without the cross. That is why we go through the fellowship of suffering as human beings and as a church.

We describe many of these accounts in the narratives and events of the martyrs. Our Egyptian Coptic Orthodox Church became the "Church of Martyrs" and is renowned by this name worldwide. That is why we say: "The Mother of the Martyrs is so beautiful" meaning the church.

Fourth: 'being conformed to His death'. This is the fourth feature of St. Paul's experience. It means a Christian person treading the path of the Lord, dies of sin. In every liturgy we attend, we hear the conclusion of the Catholic Epistle that says: "Do not love the world or the things in the world" (1 John 2: 15). The focus of a Christian and his heart's desire is continuously towards heaven. 'Being conformed to His death' is clarified by St. Paul in his strong spiritual experiences: "For your sake we are killed all day long." (Romans 8: 36). This spiritual experience written by St. Paul was expressed by the saint several times. He states: "Awake, you who sleep, arise from the dead, And Christ will give you light." (Ephesians 5: 14). He gives light to the person who sleeps in sin, or in evil, or sleeps in the love of the world, away from Christ and from the true knowledge of Christ. The person who sleeps does not know the resurrection of Christ, neither experiencing nor living it. St. Paul through the holy words, says: "Awake, you who sleep, arise from the dead, death of the sin, and Christ will give you light."

My heartfelt congratulations to all. Our hearts ache with pain for the separation of our loved ones the martyrs, but we always remember that they have fallen asleep on the hope of the resurrection. The resurrection of Christ. May God preserve and bless your lives. My message is directed to the fathers the metropolitans, bishops, priests, hegumens and presbyters, to all deacons, ministers, servants, committees of churches and church boards, to all youth, and to all children. To each family in every congregation in our Coptic Church extending to all the continents of the world. In America, Canada, Latin America, Europe, Africa, Asia and Australia.

My greetings and love along with the love of the mother church here in Egypt, we send to you. May you always enjoy the resurrection in your life. Ekhristos Anisty, Alithos Anisty. Christis risen. Truly, He is risen

"But we have this treasure in earthen vessels" (2 Cor. 4:7). My Beloved, the Blessed Children of the Holy Church,

Christ is Risen! Truly He is Risen!

It is my pleasure to wish all of you the blessings of the Glorious Feast of the Resurrection.

1-We rejoice in the Resurrection of our Lord, because it gives us the strength to face the power of evil. Amidst our celebration and rejoicing in the Resurrection of our Savor, we are following the pain and suffering that our beloved brethren in Egypt are facing, such as the terrorist attacks on the Botroseya (St. Peter) Church, St. George Church in Tanta, and St. Mark Cathedral in Alexandria; the assaults and the forced displacement of Copts in El-Arsish; and the pressure placed on some Christian young women in Upper Egypt, along with kidnappings in some cases.

Additionally, in our American society, we are facing new policies and movements that are in direct opposition to our Christian values and ethics. As we confront the forces of evil, terrorism, and extremism, it makes us feel as though we are earthen vessels.

Indeed, we are earthen vessels! However, the Resurrection of Christ gives us an enormous Treasure, Who is our Risen Lord, Who gives us the power to face the evil forces. Through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, St. Paul the Apostle wrote, "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellence of the power may be of God and not of us. We are hard pressed on every side, yet not crushed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed – always carrying about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our body" (2 Cor. 4:7-10).

How do we overcome the world that lies under the sway the wicked one?

St. John the beloved answers this question by saying, "And this is the victory that has overcome the world – our faith. Who is he who overcomes the world, but he who believes that Jesus is the Son of God?" (1 Jn. 5:4-5).

Our Faith in the Resurrection of Christ gives us the power to overcome the world.

It is this faith in the power of our Good Savior, which gives us the courage to face the forces of evil and terrorism, which martyred Veronia, Marina, and Magy in the Boutroseya Church. Yet, the mothers of these martyrs witnessed through their strong faith and overcame the world.

2- We read that Goliath the Giant looked at David and saw him as an earthen vessel. However, David, through his faith, showed the real treasure within his earthen vessel, "So the Philistine looked about and saw David, he disdained him; for he was only a youth, ruddy and good-looking...Then David said to the Philistine, 'You come to me with a sword, with a spear, and with a javelin. But I come to you in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom you have defied'" (1 Sam. 17:42, 45).

My Beloved,

Today, the world comes to us, who carry the name of Christ, with a sword, a spear, and a javelin.

The world disdains and curses us, because of our belief in our Lord and His Life-Giving Cross. To the world, we are seen as earthen vessels, but we should not have fear, because we have a precious treasure within our earthen vessels, so that the excellence of the power may be of God and not of us.

The power of Christ's Resurrection is manifested in our human weakness and gives us the victory over the wicked-ness in the world.

In his Book, On the Incarnation, St. Athanasius wrote,

"How can you think otherwise, when you see men naturally weak hastening to death, unafraid at the prospect of corruption, fearless of the descent into Hades, even indeed with eager soul provoking it, not shrinking from tortures, rather than to remain in this present life? If you see with your own eyes men and women and children, even, thus welcoming death for the sake of Christ's religion, how can you be so utterly silly and incredulous and maimed in your mind as not to realize that Christ, to Whom these all bear witness, Himself gives the victory to each, making death completely powerless for those who hold His faith and bear the sign of the cross?" (29:4)

My Beloved,

Let us pray for the peace of the Holy Church and for our beloved shepherd and father, H.H. Pope Tawadros.

Let us pray for every soul facing the power of evil.

Let us pray for the families of the martyrs and the confessors.

May our Lord grant us the power of His Glorious Resurrection and give us the strong faith to overcome the world.

Franklin Graham: Pray for Christians Being Slaughtered by ISIS in Egypt



Evangelist Franklin Graham is calling Christians to pray for believers who have fled Egypt's North Sinai province after the Islamic State has targeted the group and killed at least seven people in recent weeks.

"Pray for the church in Egypt and throughout the Muslim world as they are being slaughtered mercilessly in many places," he wrote on Facebook. "And share this with others who will pray!"

According to Reuters, 100 out of the 160 families in the North Sinai region left on Friday.

Their flight was prompted by a video released by the Islamic State earlier this week. The group vowed to step up attacks on the Christian minority in Sinai.

"They want to send a message that nobody is safe," Mina Thabet, a worker with the Egyptian Commission for Rights and Freedoms, told the Washington Post.

"I am not going to wait for death," Rami Mina, who left Friday morning, told Reuters by telephone. "I shut down my restaurant and got out of there. These people are ruthless."

A day earlier, a shopkeeper was killed in front of his pregnant wife and according to eyewitnesses the men then sat down and drank a soda and ate some chips.

"ISIS wants to exterminate them—wipe them out—because they bear the name of Christ," Graham wrote.

So far, a teacher has been shot to death by a masked gunman, another man was beheaded and set on fire, and a plumber was shot dead in front of his wife and children at their home.

"Things were never this bad," one man from El Arish told the Washington Post by phone. "They killed a couple of church leaders in the past, but the killings were far apart. Now we are told that are were making lists of all the Copts there."

Christians are being killed for their faith around the

world," Graham said.

He added that believers would be praying for their persecuted brothers and sisters at the World Summit in Defense of Persecuted Christians in Washington D.C. in May.

THE HOLY SPIRIT APPEARED AS DIVIDED TONGUES OF FIRE

The Holy Spirit descended on the holy apostles and saintly disciples on the day of Pentecost, when they were all with one accord in the upper room. The Holy Spirit appeared in three ways:

- 1- A sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind that filled the whole house.
- 2- Divided tongues, as of fire and one sat upon each of them.
- 3- They spoke with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. Thus the disciples were filled with the power of the Holy Spirit, purified and made fervent, by the tongues of fire, and evangelized the crowd, through many languages.

The Holy Spirit also appeared in other different forms. He appeared as a Dove in the baptism of our Lord Jesus Christ (Mat. 3:16). The Holy Spirit is also resembled by rivers of living water, as was mentioned by our Lord (Jn. 4:14, 7:38, 39) and prophesied by some prophets (Isa. 44:3, Jer. 2:13, Ps. 46:4, 93:3,4). The Holy Spirit is also resembled by oil. In the Old Testament, priests, kings and prophets were anointed with oil by the prophets that they might receive the Holy Spirit (Ex. 30:22-24, Lev. 8:12, 1 Sam. 16:13, 1kgs. 19:15, 16). The Orthodox churches anoint the newly baptized Christians by the holy oil (the Holy Chrism - the Myron) that they may receive the Holy Spirit (1 Jn. 2:20, 27, 2Cor. 1:21, 22).

The Meaning of the Symbols: Each of the above mentioned symbols has a spiritual and biblical meaning, which we will discus in the following:

I- The mighty wind that filled the house reveals the power of the Holy Spirit who filled everyone, present in the upper room. This wind had such a strong sound that filled the whole house and the assembly felt its power. The Lord tried to explain to Nicodemus the relation between the wind and our birth of the Spirit, as He said: "The wind blows where it wishes, and you hear the sound of it, but cannot tell where it comes from and where it goes. So is everyone who is born of the Spirit" (Jn. 3:8). Christ the Lord breathed on His disciples and said to them: "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them, if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (Jn. 20:22,23). It was also mentioned in the book of Ezekiel, in the visions of the dry bones, that the Lord said to

him: "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy son of man, and say to the breath, Thus says the Lord God: 'Come from the four winds, O breath and breathe on these slain, that they may live'" (Ezek. 37:9).

II- The dove is an innocent, meek and harmless bird (Mat. 10:16) and when our Lord was baptized in the river of Jordan by St. John the Baptist, the Holy Spirit descended upon Him in a bodily form like a dove (Mat. 3:16, Mk. 1:10, Lk. 3:22). It is a sign of good news and salvation, as happened with Noah's dove (Gen. 8:11). King Solomon addressed the human soul (the bride of Christ) saying, "My dove and my perfect one" (Song. 5:2). When the Holy Spirit dwells inside the believers, they will become innocent, harmless and blameless as doves (Phil. 2:14-16).

III- The living water is given by God, as He described Himself as the fountain of living water (Jer. 2:13) because from Him comes the Holy Spirit who gives us life (Jn. 14:26). When our Lord talked to the woman of Samaria, He said: "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is who says to you, 'give Me a drink', you would have asked Him, and He would have given you living water" (Jn. 4:10). He also continued: "Who drinks of this water will thirst again, but whoever drinks of the water that I shall give him, will become in him a fountain of water springing up into everlasting life" (Jn. 4:13,14). The Lord meant by that water, the Holy Spirit whom He gave to His believers. This is clear from the Lord's speech to the Jews on the great day of the feast: "He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, out of his heart will flow rivers of living water". The gospel added saying: "But this He spoke concerning the Spirit whom those believing in Him would receive; for the Holy Spirit was not yet given, because Jesus was not yet glorified" (Jn. 7:38,39). For this reason the church calls the baptism (the washing of the second birth), "the birth from the water and the Spirit", as was said by the Lord to Nicodemus (Jn. 3:5). It is known that water cleanses our bodies, quenches our thirst and the Holy Spirit washes away our sins and nourishes us and keeps us ready for eternal life.

IV- In the old days, oil was used in treatment of wounds (Isa. 1:6, Mk. 6:13, Jam. 5:14). It is used spiritually as a sign of consecration (Gen.28: 18, 35:14). The oil was used by Samuel the prophet to anoint King Saul and King David (Sam.

10:1, 6, 16:13) and the Spirit of God came upon them (Exod. 30:22-29). Elijah the prophet anointed with oil two kings and the prophet Elisha as commanded by God (1 King 20:15,16, 2King 9:3). The altar and its utensils are anointed with the holy oil (the Myron) to be holy for worshipping and offering the sacrifices, as said by the Lord. The oil is used for healing the sick in the name of the Lord, by the power of the Holy Spirit in the sacrament of unction of the sick (Js. 5:14). It was used for lightening the candles; the Holy Spirit enlightens those who keep Him working in them; thus keeping their vessels full of oil (Mat. 25:3,4) and the Holy Spirit makes the believers the light of the world, shining by their good deeds (Mat. 5:14-16).

V-The Fire is a symbol of the presence of God. In the Holy Bible the fire has several meanings:

- 1- The fire of God's protection and guidance: God was leading Israel in the wilderness of Sinai by a pillar of fire by night and a pillar of cloud by day during the forty years of their travel (Exod. 13:22, Deut. 1:33, Ps. 78:14).
- 2- The fire of God's presence and call: The fire was always kept burning on the altar, a sign of God's presence (Lev. 6:12,13). The Lord appeared to Moses in the burning bush and the bush was not consumed (Exod. 3:2-6). It was mentioned that God is a consuming fire (Exod. 24:17, Heb. 12:29). Daniel the prophet, saw the throne of God a fiery flame and its wheels a burning fire (Dan. 7:9).
- 3-The fire of cleaning and purifying: When Isaiah the prophet saw the glory of God, he felt unclean, and he said: "Woe is me, for I am undone! Because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts. Then one of the seraphim flew to me, having in his hand a live coal, which he had taken with the tongs from the altar. And he touched my mouth with it, and said: 'behold this has touched your lips; your iniquity is taken away, and your sin purged' " (Isa. 6:5-7).
- 4-The fire of accepting the sacrifice: When Moses the prophet and his brother Aaron offered a sacrifice, fire came out and consumed the burnt offering that was on the alter (Lev. 9:24). David the king, offered burnt offerings and peace offerings, the Lord answered from heaven by fire on the offerings (1 Chr. 21:26). The same happened when king Solomon finished building the temple, prayed and offered sacrifices, and fire came down from heaven and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices (2 Chr. 7:1). Also, when Elijah offered a burnt sacrifice the fire of the Lord fell and consumed the sacrifice and licked up the water that was in the trench (1 King. 18:38).
- 5- The fire of punishment the wicked: The Lord rained brimstone and fire on Sodom and Gomorrah, from the Lord out of the heavens (Gen. 19:24). When Ahaziah, the evil king of Samaria, sent to Elijah a captain of fifty with his fifty men and asked him to come down from the top of the hill, the man of God was sad for the wickedness of the king. He let fire to

come down from heaven and consumed the captain and his fifty men. This happened twice (2 King. 1:7-12).

6- The fire of teaching and testimony: On the day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples of the Lord in the form of tongues of fire, and sat upon each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak with other tongues (Act. 2:3,4). The Lord has given His disciples the promise of the Holy Spirit, before His crucifixion, saying:

"He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you" (Jn. 14:26).

They could testify of Christ and bear witness to all nations. The Holy Spirit guided them into all truth, told them all things to come (Jn. 16:13), as the Lord foretold them: "He will glorify Me, for He will take of what is Mine and declare it to you" (Jn. 16:14). The Holy Spirit still makes us spiritually fervent, guides us into all truth, and tells us things to come (Jn. 16:13). The Lord said also: "He will convict the world of sin" (Jn. 16:8).

7- The fire of condemnation: This fire is prepared for Satan and his soldiers, as well as the sinful, the wicked and the unprofitable people. The Lord will say to them: "Depart from Me, you cursed, into the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels" (Mat.25:41). He also declared this to the Jews, saying: "Therefore as the tares are gathered and burned in the fire, so it will be at the end of this age. The Son of Man will send out His angels and they will gather out of His kingdom all things that offend, and those who practice lawlessness, and will cast them into the furnace of fire" (Mat. 13:40-42). It was also revealed to St. John that on the judgment day, the beast, the false prophet, and their followers would be cast into the lake of fire burning with brimstone, to be tormented forever (Rev. 14:10, 20:20).

The day of Pentecost is a great day. It is the birthday of the church. Let us pray with one accord, saying: "O Heavenly King, the Comforter, the Spirit of truth, who is present in all places and fill all, the treasury of good things and the Life-Giver, graciously come and dwell in us and purify us from all defilement, O Good One and save our souls". (The third hour prayer, in the agpeya).

Perseverance of Job and its Happy Ending

"YOU HAVE HEARD OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF JOB AND SEEN THE END INTENDED BY THE LORD THAT THE LORD IS VERY COMPASSIONATE AND MERCIFUL" (JAMES 5:11).

Why Good (God's) People Suffer?!

This is not the story of a man suffering silently, patiently in the night. This is the story of a man yelling at God- a man who wants answers now. This man is Job.

And he has just lost nearly everything he has spent his life working for: his riches, his children and his health.

He has just one quick question for the Creator and Sustainer of the universe. It is the same question a mother asks after watching her kindergarten son get crushed under the wheels of a school bus. It is the question an aging grandfather asks when he finds out he has cancer. It's the question a middle-aged father asks after learning he's been laid off from the company he has dedicated himself to for the past 30 years.

Why? Why?!!! The entire book of Job is wrestling with the question WHY, and why me?

For Job, self-perceived wise men answer the question. But they answer it wrong. Then for Job and for us, God answers the question. It's not a complete answer.

But it was complete enough for Job.

Behind the Scenes of Job

Job, a wealthy man who loses his riches, children, and health (1:1). *Eliphaz*, the three of Job's friends who try to convince him that he sinned (2:11).

Bildad, the second of Job's friends to speak (2:11).

Zophar, the third friend to speak (2:11).

Elihu, a bystander who argues with job and his friends (32:2)

Job's wife, who tells her husband to curse God and die, so the suffering will end (2:9).

Plot Job is a rich man who owns thousands of sheep, camels, cattle, and donkeys. He's also blessed with a large family of 10 children. But he loses them all in one tragic day. Raiders take his herds and kill his servants. A windstorm crushes a house where his children are eating. Then he Job breaks out with skin ulcers all over his body.

What to look for:

The format. As a kind of road map to the book, notice the three cycles of debate between Job and his three friends. Each cycle run like this. Friend #1 talks, job replies, friend #2, Job, friend #3, Job. (The one exception comes at the end of the third cycle, when friend #3 keeps silent. Instead, a bystander adds his thought about the matter). This routine takes up most of the book.

Job's persistence that he is innocent:

Like many others in his day, Job believes that health and wealth are signs of God's blessing- disease and poverty are signs of sin. Because Job knows he has done nothing to deserve the horror that has invaded his life, he is left wondering why God is putting him through all this. Bitterness begins to engulf him as he sarcastically complains, "God destroys the innocent along with the guilty. When a good person dies a sudden death, God sits back and laughs!" (9:22).

Author and date:

The writer is unknown for sure. Some scholars think it is Job himself. Others think that Job wrote some notes, then Moses found them when he came to Median and added to them to comfort his people during their oppression and affliction in Egypt. The writer used the Hebrew name for God, Yahweh, a term sometimes translated Jehovah or the Lord. The story seems to be set sometime in the era of Israel's founding fathers: Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. Several clues suggest this. As was common in Abraham's day, his wealth was measured by his herds, and he acted as the priest for his family by offering sacrifices to God. In addition, he was raided by Sabeans and Chaldeans, who lived in patriarchal times. Some think the book of Job was written in Arabic language because the Land of Uz (near Edom southeast of Canaan) was in Arabian Peninsula and the names of Job's friends seem Arabian.

Most important than that, there is No mention at all to the Law of Moses or to the Tabernacles or the Red Sea, which proves that it was written before the time of Moses. Jewish writings from the second century B.C. speak about the book of Job, showing that it was well respected by then. But the purpose of the book is clear. It corrects the ancient misunderstanding that suffering is God's punishment. The fact is, as the book of Job dramatically shows, good people are not exempt from suffering. Even Christ's disciples, in the case of the born blind man, thought that what happened to him was due to his sin or his parents sins; but Jesus said, "neither he sinned nor his parents..."

Big Scenes from Job

Job is a godly man who lives near the desert, perhaps east of what is now Israel. He is rich in herds and servants to tend them. He is also rich in children, with seven sons and three daughters.

Satan, however, decides to test Job's loyalty to God. And God allows the test. Some tribes kill the herdsmen and then steal Job's cattle, donkeys, and camels.

A mysterious fire kills the sheep and their shepherds. And a windstorm crushes the home of his oldest son, where all the children have gathered for a meal.

Grief-stricken at the news, Job tears his robe and shaves his head and said: "The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the LORD" (1:21).

With his wealth and children gone, Job now suffers a third great loss, his health. He becomes infected with a painful skin disease that covers his body with open, festering sores. We can only guess what kind of disease it is; small-pox, chronic eczema, ulcerous boils. Whatever it is, it's agonizing. Job's wife can't stand to see him suffer. "Why do you still trust God?" she asks. Why don't you curse him and die?" (2:9).

Job absolutely refuses. "Don't talk like a fool" he replies. "If we accept blessings from God, we must accept trouble as well.

Three of Job's friends come and sit silently with him for seven days. Finally Job breaks the silence. "I wish I had been born dead and then buried" (3:16). One by one, his friends respond. They are certain Job has sinned, and he won't find relief until he repents. "In my experience, " Eliphas says, "only those who plant seeds of evil harvest trouble" (4:8). Bildad asks Job, "Why don't you turn to him and start living right? Then he will decide to rescue and restore you" (8:5). Zophar then says to this tormented man who has lost nearly everything, "God has punished you less than you deserve" (11:6).

In the hard debate that follow, Job maintains his innocence and retaliates, "Miserable comforters are you all" (16:2). Eventually, he turns his attack heavenward: "You,

God are the reason I am insulted and spit on" (17:6).

A forth and younger man named Elihu joins the gathering. He takes on the whole group He's angry with Job for blaming God instead of himself. And he's angry at the three men for not being able to prove Job wrong.

As the youngster drones on, a storm begins rolling in.

Suddenly, from out of this storm, God speaks to Job, answered him by raising 30 questions, (that took four chapters from 38-41) no human can answer.

"How did I lay the foundation for the earth?" (38:4). "Where is the home of light, and where does darkness live?" (38:19). God's point is clear: there are some things that human beings can't understand. And suffering is one of them.

"I am the Lord All-Powerful, but you have argued that I am wrong," God accuses Job. "Are you trying to prove that you are innocent by accusing Me of injustice?" (40:2, 8).

Finally, Job was embarrassed, "I have talked about things that are far beyond my understanding," he admits. "I have heard of You by hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees You. Therefore I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes." (42:5).

The Happy Ending

God now turns His attention to Job's friends. "I am angry at you," God says, "for not telling the truth." Then He orders these men to go to Job-the man they had been wrongly accusing in a very cruel way, He will punish them for their foolishness.

Each man expresses his sorrow to Job, and gives him gifts of gold and silver. "Now the Lord blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning, for he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, one thousand yoke of oxen, and one thousand female donkeys. He also had seven sons and three daughters. After this Job lived on hundred and forty years, and saw his children and grandchildren for four generations (Job 42:12-16).

In Ezekiel 14:14, we find God honoring Job again and considered him one of the great heroes of faith and patience, equal to "NOAH, DANIEL and JOB". Also, the New Testament referred to Job and his great perseverance, saying: "Indeed we count them blessed who endure. You have heard of the perseverance of Job and seen the end intended by the Lord- that the Lord is very compassionate and merciful" (James 5:11). Finally, note that the suffering and patience of Job was a little shadow of the suffering and patience of whom is greater than Job; whom St. Paul referred to saying: "May the Lord direct your hearts into the love of God and *into the patience of Christ*" (2 Thess. 3:5).

THE COSMOLOGICAL EVIDENCE for a Creator



"The heavens declare the glory of God; and the expanse proclaims His handiwork." (Ps 19:1)

Does scientific evidence support the belief in a higher intelligence that could have created the universe?

In cosmology, the term "Big Bang" refers to a theory that explains the origin of the universe. In 1927 Georges Lemaître, a cosmologist and astrophysicist, noted that the expanding universe could be traced back in time to a single point, which would be the beginning of the expansion of the universe. Based on the rate of expansion, scientists placed this point at 13.8 billion years ago, which would be the age of our universe.

The term "Big Bang" was coined with derision in 1949 by Sir Fred Hoyle, a British scientist in astronomy, who did not believe that the universe could have a beginning. He believed that the universe has no beginning and no end. But over the years his view was shared by fewer and fewer scientists as more evidence came in support of the Big Bang theory which gained more and more acceptance. Now most scientists acknowledge that the universe has a beginning.

In the book of "Genesis" the Bible starts with the verse "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." (Gen 1:1), According to the laws of logic, anything that has a beginning must have a cause.

William Lane Craig, a modern Christian apologetic philosopher, presents the following argument called "Kalam cosmological argument" as follows:

- 1. Whatever begins to exist has a cause
- 2. The universe began to exist; therefore:
- 3. The universe has a cause

This leads to his next argument, which goes as follows:

- 1. The universe has a cause;
- 2. If the universe has a cause, then uncaused, personal creator of the universe exists that transcends the universe.
- 3. Therefore, the uncaused personal creator of the universe is beginning-less, changeless, immaterial, timeless, spaceless & enormously powerful.

The Bible also says that the universe has an end as mentioned in the 2nd epistle of Apostle Peter:

"But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night, in which the heavens will pass away with a rushing noise, and the elements will melt with fervent heat. And the earth and the works in it will be burned up." (2 Pet. 3:10)

According to Wikipedia: "The heat death of the universe is a plausible ultimate fate of the universe in which the universe has diminished to a state of no thermodynamic free energy and therefore can no longer sustain processes that increase entropy. The theory of heat death of the universe stems from the second law of thermodynamics, of which one version states that "entropy(gradual decline into disorder) tends to increase in an isolated system (like our universe)". This shows that scientific evidence supports the Bible accounts regarding the fate of the universe.

In conclusion:





ISTANBUL — When 22 Christian refugees gathered in the basement of an apartment in Istanbul early on a recent Sunday afternoon, it was quickly clear that this was no ordinary prayer meeting. Several of them had Islamic names. There was an Abdelrahman and even a couple of Mohammads. Strangest of all, they jokingly referred to their host — one of the two Mohammads — as an irhabi. A terrorist. If Bashir Mohammad took the joke well, it was because there was once some truth to it. Today, Mr. Mohammad, 25, has a cross on his wall and invites other recent converts to weekly Bible readings in his purple-walled living room. Less than four years ago, however, he says he fought on the front lines of the Syrian civil war for the Nusra Front, an offshoot of Al Qaeda. He is, he says, a jihadi who turned to Jesus. It is a transition that has surprised everyone, not least of all himself. Four years ago, Mr. Mohammad tells me, "Frankly I would have slaughtered anyone who suggested it." Not only have his beliefs changed, but his temperament has, too. Today, his wife, Hevin Rashid, confirms, with a hint of understatement, that he is "much better to be around."

The conversion of Muslim refugees to Christianity is not a new phenomenon, particularly in majority-Christian countries. Converts sometimes stand accused of trying to enhance their chances of asylum by making it dangerous to deport them back to places with a history of Islamist persecution.

Mr. Mohammad's particular experience, however, does not fit easily into this narrative. He lives in a majority-Muslim country, has little interest in seeking asylum in the West and treads an unlikely path followed by few former jihadis. His is a story that began in a Kurdish part of northern Syria, Afrin, where he grew up in a Muslim family. Mr. Mohammad flirted with extremism in his teens. His cousin took him to hear jihadist preachers as a 15-year-old, and he adhered to some of the most extreme interpretations of Islam, "even the ones you haven't heard of." But when war broke out in Syria, after the country's 2011 uprising, Mr. Mohammad initially joined the secular Kurdish forces in their fight for autonomy. Mr. Mohammad's subsequent ideological journey rarely made complete sense. But by his account, he became traumatized by the deaths he witnessed on the front line, which in turn re-energized his interest in the extremist versions of Islam that he had learned about as a teenager. "When I saw all these dead bodies," he said, "it made me believe all these

things they said in the lectures. It made me seek the greatness of religion." Or, at least, his violent interpretations of that religion. When a friend invited him to defect in summer 2012 to the Nusra Front, a group that seeks to establish an extremist state, Mr. Mohammad readily agreed. As a Nusra fighter, he continued to witness extreme brutality. His colleagues executed several captives by crushing them with a bulldozer. Another prisoner was forced to drink several liters of water after his genitals were tied shut with string. This time, however, Nusra's propaganda made the violence seem tolerable. "They used to tell us these people were the enemies of God," Mr. Mohammad said, "and so I looked on these executions positively."

When I first met Mr. Mohammad, in his basement, I guessed at none of this. In fact, I was there to observe one of his guests, a Yazidi who had converted two months earlier. Mr. Mohammad seemed to be the group's glue and behaved as though he had been born and bred a Christian. It was Mr. Mohammad who led the first prayers and chants. ("People who have fled their homes," began one, "God bring them safety.") And it was he who distributed the coffee afterward. His calm poise was jogged only when his guests jokingly referred to him as the irhabi, a sobriquet that sent a sheepish smile across his youthful face. Mr. Mohammad wears a cross and has one on the wall of his living room, where other recent converts join him for weekly Bible readings.

In his previous life, however, Mr. Mohammad said he was an angry man whose temper frightened his relatives. When he briefly returned home for his family's Kurdish New Year celebrations in March 2013, Mr. Mohammad was repulsed by what he saw as blasphemous celebrations, whose origins lay outside the Islamic tradition. Indoctrinated by his months with Nusra, he spent his leave in isolation with Ms. Rashid, who was then his fiancée. Both she and his parents tried to persuade him not to return to the front line, but he ignored them.

But back at the front, Mr. Mohammad finally began to question Nusra's motives. Scanning government territory through his binoculars, he says he saw Syrian government soldiers executing a line of prisoners with a bulldozer and concluded there was little difference between their behavior and that of his colleagues.

Disenchanted, he risked execution himself by deserting Nusra, and returning home to Afrin. "I went to Nusra in search of my God," he said. "But after I saw Muslims killing Muslims, I realized there was something wrong." The next year, he and his wife fled the war entirely, leaving for Istanbul and joining around 2.5 million other Syrians in exile in Turkey. Still a zealous Muslim, Mr. Mohammad prayed so loudly that his upstairs neighbors complained. "They used to ask me, 'When are you going to turn into a prophet?'" He still required Ms. Rashid to cover her hair and neck, and planned for her to wear a niqab, or full-face covering. It was nevertheless Ms. Rashid herself who unwittingly prompted her husband's rejection of Islam. In early 2015, she fell seriously ill. As her health worsened, Mr. Mohammad described her condition in a phone call with his cousin Ahmad — the same cousin who had taken him to jihadist lectures as a teenager. Ahmad was now living in Canada and, in a move that shocked Mr. Mohammad, had converted to Christianity.


An enthusiastic convert, Ahmad asked Mr. Mohammad to place his telephone close to Ms. Rashid, so that his prayer group could sing and pray for her health. Horrified, Mr. Mohammad initially refused, since he had been taught to find Christianity repellent. But he was also desperate, and eventually he gave in.

When Ms. Rashid improved within a few days, Mr. Mohammad ascribed it to his cousin's intervention. Intrigued, he then began to entertain a sacrilegious thought. He asked his cousin to recommend a Christian preacher in Istanbul who might introduce him to the religion. He was put in touch with Eimad Brim, a missionary from an evangelical group based in Jordan called the Good Shepherd, who agreed to meet with him. Mr. Brim said Mr. Mohammad was quickly persuaded by the benefits of a conversion, despite the lethal danger in which it would place him. "It was Bashir who was looking for Eimad," said Mr. Brim, who also confirmed other parts of Mr. Mohammad's narrative. "It was easy."

Exactly why he sought solace in Christianity, rather than a more mainstream version of Islam, no one can explain. Reading the Bible, Mr. Mohammad claimed, made him calmer than reading the Quran. The churches he attended, Mr. Mohammad said, made him feel more welcome than the neighborhood mosques.

In his personal view, Christian prayers were more generous than Muslim ones. But these are subjective claims, and many would reject the characterization of Islam as a less benign religion, much as they would reject Nusra's extremist interpretation of it.

For Mr. Mohammad and Ms. Rashid, perhaps it was their dreams that sealed their conversion. As the couple began to consider leaving Islam, Ms. Rashid said she dreamed of a biblical figure who used heavenly powers to divide the waters of the sea, which Mr. Mohammad interpreted as a sign of encouragement from Jesus. Then, Mr. Mohammad himself dreamed Jesus had given him some chickpeas. The pair felt loved. "There's a big gap between the god I used to worship and the one I worship now," Mr. Mohammad said. "We used to worship in fear. Now everything has changed." For Mr. Mohammad, all this has nevertheless come at a high price. His rejection of Islam makes him a target for his fundamentalist former allies and he fears they will one day catch up with him. If they do, however, he reckons he now has the greatest protection of all. "I trust," he says, "in God."



She was very generous with the poor and hospitable to relatives and friends and encouraged her family members to do the same. and would have loved the idea to become more widespread.

Perhaps most memorably, Alvina had a real visceral love-love with grit, the kind of love that endures, suffers, persists, conquers, and forgives endlessly. She was an unstoppable, untiring force of nature that flourished unhindered for 93 years; bringing light and awe to literally everyone she met. She spoke of love often, perhaps because she understood it in her bones better than anyone else. Her great faith helped her endure the chock of losing her son Adel in a hate crime after September 11, 2001. Indeed she deserves the title to be the "Ideal Mother."

We mourn for the loss of our beloved mother, grandmother, and great grandmother. Her joyous presence at the heart of our family gatherings will be sorely missed. 
